From Our Rabbi

The very words of the Pesach Haggadah call out to us this time of year: *Kol Dichfin Yetay Ve-Yechol*. "Let All Who are Hungry Come and Eat." In our own community, thanks to the efforts of several dedicated volunteers, I am proud to announce that Etz Chaim has three initiatives to ensure that no one in our community will go hungry during Passover this year.



Our first initiative is an old one that's been around for centuries: selling the rabbi your Chametz before Passover. How does selling your Chametz feed the hungry? When you sell me your Chametz as one final "spot-check" to spiritually free your home from all leavened products prior to Passover, it is traditional that you give me a rough approximation of the value of your Chametz (usually, a few dollars). You may not know that I then collect those funds and donate them in a lump sum to the *Maos Chitim Fund* at JF&CS. *Maos Chitim,* literally meaning "bread money," is a fund that JF&CS uses to purchase grocery store gift cards to enable people to buy food for Passover. I am grateful for our partnership with JF&CS that allows us to support needy Jews in our greater Atlanta family.

We are also pleased this Pesach season to be entering into a new and exciting partnership with Mt. Bethel Church (our neighbors on the other side Fairfield Drive) and MUST Ministries under the direction of our Rabbi-at-Large, Rabbi Albert Slomovitz. Following the success of last year's initiative, emails have been sent out from our congregation seeking donations to purchase boxes of food to distribute to seniors needing a little extra help in our local Cobb community around Easter and Passover. On March 27, Sunday school students from Mt. Bethel came to Etz Chaim and joined with our students to make non-sectarian holiday cards. On Sunday, April 3, a limited number of volunteers will be gathering in the MUST warehouse to package the food. We look forward to making this an annual tradition in our community.

Lastly, but not least, our reconstituted Backpack Buddies Program will feed families facing food insecurity in our community. Partnering with East Valley Elementary, twenty-five students a week now receiving subsidized school lunches and facing food insecurity will have bags packed to take home with them over the weekend. As an ongoing project, we are seeking volunteers to assist in the buying, packing, and delivery of food, which is now being stored at the *Bayit*. We are also looking for donors who may be interested in underwriting costs of the program so that we may expand and feed even more families. As a community, we are grateful to our social action chair Bob Beer, and to Lauren and Gavi Surden and Angie and Hannah Nothdurft for their leadership in getting this off the ground.

It's shocking that in our world of abundance we still must invite hungry people to join us to come and eat on Passover. Yet in addition to our work with Rebecca's Tent, ably run by Robin Spiegel, our Operation Isaiah Food Drive over the High Holy Days, and the Hunger Walk in early spring run by Sheri and Bob Frohlich, our synagogue is carrying on the important work of reaching out to those in need so that no one should go hungry.

From Our Associate Rabbi

"Let all who are hungry come and eat" I love the holiday of Passover. I am sure this feeling is not mutual among all who are reading this article but for me it was a special time of year. Growing up I actually loved helping to turn the house completely over to being kosher I'Pesach



and it was always my job to vacuum and clean out the cars of all the potential *chametz*. I loved the holiday because it meant that I got to use dishes, like my batman glass or looney tunes coffee mug, that were only brought out for the festival.

Yet, the thing that I grew to love were the seders. This was never a holiday where our extended family came together to celebrate but was rather a time where we got to spend it with congregants and colleagues of my father. I recall one seder went so late that it was about 2:00 a.m. when everyone left (this is what happens when you have three rabbis sitting around a table)! As I matured and was making my way through rabbinical school, I anxiously waited for when I would be able to host a Pesach seder like my father and mother did.

In my first year "on the job", I was finally able to make this wish a reality. We decided, since Aria was so young, to invite over several families with young children so she would be entertained from the experience as well. During the seder there is a moment when we are to open the door and invite anyone in who might be hungry to come and join us for the seder. I recall giving this task to the children in attendance and they were so excited to see if anyone would be joining us. One boy got so into it that the minute the door opened he ran up and down our apartment complex hallway saying, "LET ALL WHO ARE HUNGRY COME AND EAT!!!" Surprisingly, nobody peeked their heads out of their apartments to see what the noise was all about, and we finished the seder with just those in attendance. That Pesach in 2019 was the last one we have been able to join our friends and community to celebrate our collective redemption from Egypt.

I am thrilled to invite all of you who are reading this article to please sign up for our community seder on April 15, at 6:30 p.m. here at Etz Chaim. We will have options for everyone, and it should be an amazing time to celebrate and be with one another. The firm deadline to sign up for the program is on Thursday, April 7. I hope that you will join me and my family and your Etz Chaim family as we recall our leaving Egypt. May it be a point that we recall in years to come as the first Pesach we were able to celebrate together as we come out of this COVID-19 as best as we can.

With that I say, "Let all who are hungry come and eat!"

Ovarian Cancer – Let's get EmpowHERed (educated)

Over the past few years, David and I have become involved in an organization called Tina's Wish that supports Ovarian Cancer Research. We have been able to learn so



much about this deadliest gynecologic cancer. Tina's Wish offers a series of webisodes designed to educate and empower women in relation to their gynecologic health. Knowledge is power! For additional information and previous recordings of the EMPOWER series, visit tinaswish.org/EmpowHERseries.

It is our desire to share this information with as many people as possible because ovarian cancer often goes undiagnosed for a long while since many of the common symptoms are simply dismissed as just that. The chart at the end will list many of these common ailments to be aware of.

The mission to educate people about ovarian cancer has become a personal matter as the blog entry below was written by a close friend of ours — reading it strengthened my resolve that we had to take up the fight and help her spread the word.

A day in the life of an Ovarian Cancer Survivor

Yesterday Dan and I went on a romantic Valentine's Day date to Costco because he saw on Instagram that they had chocolate covered strawberries (they did not). I went to get some shampoo for Dan while he went to the bathroom. Suddenly I found myself crying alone in the tampon aisle.

I miss my period. I miss my dreams of being pregnant. I miss not being in menopause.

I am depressed. It's hard to maintain the same joy and connection I've always had with people, things, activities in my life. I feel guilty that I'm not being a good friend, partner, daughter, etc.

What if none of my embryos take to the surrogate's uterus? What if my medicine stops working? What if I am too weak to work? What if my chemo brain fog puts me in a situation that's dangerous or where I can't remember something important? What if it comes back and treatment doesn't work? What if I die? What if I'm so sick that I want to die?

The weight of thinking about cancer and what it has done to my life during almost every waking moment is exhausting, unfair and just so sad. I don't know if it will get easier. In the past year, it's only gotten harder, so I have a hard time seeing an end to the challenges I face each day. I appreciate everyone who lets me talk about my cancer candidly and everyone who wants to know what my days are like and what goes on inside my brain.

Thank you for being patient with me.

My heart broke when I read this blog entry and all I could tell her was that she was loved, to stay strong, and to know that she was here for a higher purpose. That she would educate others about this horrible disease and that she would impact lives with her story. This is why it is so important to us to share her story and encourage others to be empowHERed with knowledge.

From our President Jamie Platt Lyons

Passover is my very favorite Jewish holiday, even though bread is my very favorite food. I really, really love bread (I mean a lot). That said, somehow Passover has never been about not eating bread. For me, Passover has always been about family . . . lots of family.



When I was a child, we always went to Grandma Dee and Grandpa Perry's high-rise on Sutton Place in Manhattan for Passover. We had at least 30 people on my mother's side of the family stuffed into my grandparents' one-bedroom apartment. I don't remember much of the Seders from that time, but I do remember experiences with my cousins. We bowled with plastic pins and balls in the hallway. We climbed around the adults' feet under the table pretending to be in a secret spy club. We created gymnastics and magic routines that were performed for the whole family. It was always a time of great laughter and companionship.

Thirty years later things changed when my mother died on April 27, 2005, the fifth day of Passover. We were able to celebrate Seder, but the rest of Passover revolved around my mother's funeral arrangements and sitting shiva in my childhood home in Rye, New York. When I returned to Atlanta, I started going to Etz Chaim minyan in the mornings or evenings so I could say Kaddish every day.

Minyan was amazing. It was like a little club. There were people with me every day also saying Kaddish for a loved one. It gave me a time and place to focus on my mom. In the mornings I sat in the same spot every day (right behind Richard Smith). As the sun would rise, it would shine through the window above the arc directly on my spot. Without knowing it, I started associating the streaming sun with my relationship to my mom. To this day, almost 17 years later when I am outside and the sun peeks out from behind a cloud, I automatically look up and quietly say to myself, "Hi, Mommy." During those 11 months of saying Kaddish in "my spot" in the chapel, I created a stronger relationship with Etz Chaim, with my fellow minyanaires, and with my mother.

The experience of grieving would have been very different if Etz Chaim did not support and provide a twice-daily minyan opportunity. Today, 17 years later, we don't have much trouble getting 10 people together for regular morning minyan. However, we really need the participation of our congregation for weekday evening minyan. We have trouble getting 10 on Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday evenings. (Our Board of Trustees makes sure we get 10 on Sundays and our USY group attends most Wednesday evenings to provide a minyan.)

Most congregants do not think about minyan until they need/want to say Kaddish for a loved one. It's only then that you realize how important it is to show up. If each congregant agreed to attend evening minyan two times per year, we would have no troubles getting 10 every evening of the week.

So if you are driving by the synagogue, if you are picking up a child at religious school on Tuesday, if you have some time to spare (less than 30 minutes) between 6:30 and 7:00 p.m. any night of the week during any week of the year, please join us for evening minyan. I promise you, when you are one of the 10 people in the chapel enabling someone to say Kaddish, you know you are doing a mitzvah and it feels really good.

Passover took on a very different feeling after my mom died. While I still smile and laugh about my childhood memories of me and my cousins, Passover is also about remembering and honoring my mother on her yahrzeit. Morning and evening minyan at Etz Chaim help me carry on her memory in a meaningful Jewish way and that takes commitment from all of us.

Passover, a time of new beginnings.

When Pesach comes around, whether it's "late" or "early", it reminds me that we have another opportunity for a new beginning. Although the notion of cleaning my house isn't always appealing, there is something



comforting in the ritual of emptying drawers, cabinets, and closets in my kitchen to get rid of the chametz, the crumbs that are left after seemingly after every snack and meal we eat. A clean kitchen brings a sense of satisfaction and order. A new look for familiar space. I'm also reminded that springtime might be a good time to evaluate our health needs and perhaps begin a new health regime — eating better, exercising (or exercising more consistently), meditating, and being mindful of our mental and physical health. Our health decisions shouldn't be relegated to January's New Year; we can take a pre-Pesach moment to check in with our health.

As I write this article in early March, I'm doing so in Asheville, NC, where I'm with Craig, Virginia, and Mira and getting to know our newest family member, our grandson, who was born on the first. Talk about a new beginning!! His birth is a perfect reminder that life changes all the time; we can stop and take a breath, look at all the meaningful things we have and remember that every day is a new day. We can continue to live in our old ways, or take stock, and make changes and grow whenever and however we want. When you read this, April will be here, our grandson will be a month older (and hopefully have a name!) and we'll be getting ready for Pesach. I wish you all a sense of newness, of beginning the next quarter in this calendar year on a positive note of happiness and growth.






What I haven't told you is how we are connected to this survivor. And how she is also connected to Etz Chaim. Ellie is our daughter Jessie's oldest friend; they met in preschool in New Jersey and quickly became best buddies. When Ellie got older, she was a camper and then a counselor at a day camp whose director was our very own Lori Gilbert. We love her like she is one of our own – we watched her as the preschool bride, flew her and her mom across the country to be at birthday parties when we moved, attended her Bat Mitzvah, and just last year, in the midst of her chemotherapy, watched it all come full circle as she and Dan got married.

Ellie is 28 years old. She is certainly not who you would expect to hear about when discussing ovarian cancer, which is exactly why her story is so important to share with the women in your lives. She complained to her doctors about common ailments, and they brushed it off as IBS or a UTI. No one listened closely enough because they saw a young, vibrant woman, and by the time someone finally decided to take a deeper look, they found not only ovarian cancer but metastasis on multiple organs. Egg retrieval, multiple surgeries, chemotherapy, the loss of the ability to carry a child, menopause at 27, scans every 6 months. Had someone taken the time to explore her symptoms earlier, things could have been much different.

Early detection is so important. 80% of women are, like Ellie, diagnosed at an advanced stage. 27% of women diagnosed during an advanced stage survive for five years. We need to do better at early diagnosis. Learn the symptoms and learn how to advocate for

the women in your lives. Please take the time to review the following chart and consider registering for the webisodes. Know Early. Know Hope. This is the mission of Tina's Wish.



A Message from Rabbi Albert Slomovitz

Dear friends, for the past few years, the world might have felt like a place of despair and hopelessness. Between Covid and the current situation in Ukraine, it seems like the ability to have positive actions that can be associated with "Tikkun Olam" (Repairing the World) are in short supply. We at Etz Chaim, in the coming weeks, have some opportunities to do such acts that will push back against prejudice and poverty.

First, please participate in the "40-fying" campaign. The goal of this is to fulfill the words that we say at our Seders:

"All who are hunger-let them come and eat." MUST Ministries have identified seniors in our community that don't have enough funds to cover their monthly food and medical expenses. Often, they skip meals to afford medications. Partnering with MUST and Mt. Bethel Church we are providing a number of 40-pound boxes filled with staple food items to be delivered to these seniors in need. Since each box costs \$40, we named the campaign the "40-fying" project.

These cards held bright pictures and words of greeting and salutation. Imagine the delight of those receiving the food boxes to have such wonderful cards!

This unique opportunity to partner with our friends at Mt Bethel will continue on Sundays, April 3, 13 and 14 as both congregations are invited to the MUST Distribution Center at 1280 Field Pkwy., Marietta, 30066, to help place food items in the boxes as well as the cards of greeting that our children have made. MUST is saying that they can only accommodate 10 folks from each community per day. I hope that you find the time to participate in this important event. - 3. Students may only receive one lifetime award.
- 4. The applicant must participate in a formal program of at least 28 days that is sponsored by one of the following organizations: a.) Congregation Etz Chaim b.) A recognized youth movement c.) A Jewish School or d.) An Israeli University
- 5. The program must take place in Israel or in the United States. Exceptions will be evaluated by the Men's Club Board on a case-by-case basis.
- 6. The applicant must provide a short essay that describes what they expect to gain from the program they will be attending. When providing the essay in the online form, it should be saved to a local device before submitting the application.
- 7. Notice of acceptance from the program, including the program name and address, must accompany the application.
- 8. Applicants must apply online via the link below by May 1, 2022.
- 9. The applicant must provide an email address to facilitate timely communication.

Get a candle and start your search for chametz

THE SEARCH FOR CHAMETZ (BEDIKAT CHAMETZ)

In prohibiting the use of any leaven during the week of Passover, the Torah enjoins that "leaven shall not be seen with thee in all thy borders" (Ex. XII:7) and "No leaven shall be found in your houses" (Ex. XII:19). In order that these injunctions should be fulfilled both in the letter and the spirit, the rabbis ordained that a thorough search shall be made for chametz on the night before the beginning of the festival.

The search is to be conducted by candlelight so that no corner of the house shall be overlooked and even the smallest particle of leaven removed. On the following morning all remaining chametz is to be destroyed by fire, just as in Temple times any part of an offering, which had been accidentally retained in excess of its prescribed time limit, was relegated to the fire. (Search for Chametz is Thursday night, April 14 at 8:35 p.m.)

Having thus disposed of your chametz, the following declaration of annulment is cited: "May all leaven in my possession, whether I have seen it or not, or whether I have removed it or not, be annulled, considered as dust of the earth." This absolves you from responsibility for any chametz which might accidentally have been overlooked. This is a lovely tradition to follow, one that adds to the excitement of the season. For details, consult either page 140 of the First Jewish Catalogue or any complete Passover Haggadah.

SELLING THE CHAMETZ

Any chametz owned by a Jew during the Passover week is forbidden for actual use. If one cannot dispose of all chametz before the approach of the Passover holiday, he must arrange for a formal "MECHIRAT CHAMETZ" or sale of that chametz to a non-Jew.

All such chametz in your possession should be collected and placed in a spare room, closet or trunk and locked. All chametz dishes and utensils should also be placed in a special closet or room until after Pesach. You should then authorize the Rabbi to draw up a bill of sale and negotiate the transfer to a non-Jew. Every attempt should be made to see the Rabbi personally. If that is not possible, kindly mail the form below to Rabbi Dorsch. It must reach the Rabbi by Friday April 15, by 12:32 p.m.

I hereby authorize Rabbi Daniel Dorsch to dispose of all my chametz, wherever it may be stored. This I do in accordance with the requirements and provisions of Jewish law.

This guide was prepared for the Rabbinical Assembly Committee on Jewish Law and Standards by Rabbi Mayer Rabinowitz. It was accepted by the Committee on December 12, 1984. The last paragraph of the introduction, as well as Part A under "Permitted Foods" have been amended to reflect more recent decisions of the Committee affecting the status of peanut, peanut oil and certain cheeses.

The Torah prohibits the ownership of chametz (leaven) during Pesach. Therefore, we arrange for the sale of the chametz to a non-Jew. The transfer, mekhirat chametz, is accomplished by appointing an agent, usually the Rabbi, to handle the sale. It is a valid and legal transfer of ownership. At the end of the holiday, the agent arranges for the reversion of ownership of the now-permitted chametz. If ownership of the chametz was not transferred before the holiday, the use of this chametz is prohibited after the holiday as well (chametz she-avar alav ha-Pesach).

Since the Torah prohibits the eating of chametz during Pesach, and since many common foods contain some admixture of chametz, guidance is necessary when shopping and preparing for Pesach.

During the eight days of Pesach, chametz cannot lose its identity in admixture. Therefore, the minutest amount of chametz renders the whole admixture chametz and its use on Pesach is prohibited. However, during the rest of the year, chametz follows the normal rules of admixture, i.e. it loses its identity in an admixture of one-part chametz and sixty parts of non-chametz. This affords us the opportunity to differentiate between foods purchased before and during Pesach.

What follows is a general guideline. However, your Rabbi should be consulted when any doubt arises. Kosher le-Pesach labels that do not bear the name of a Rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting your Rabbi.

Prohibited foods include the following leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffees containing cereal derivatives, wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye, and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol.

As of 2015, the Conservative Movement's Committee on Jewish Law and Standards (CJLS) has permitted the eating of Kitniyot (rice and various legumes) by those of Ashkenazi lineage. For those who choose to follow this response, they may choose to keep Passover according to the Sephardic custom.

Most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods (kitniyot) to the above list: rice, corn, millet, legumes (beans and peas; however, string beans are permitted). The Committee on Jewish Law and Standards has ruled unanimously that peanuts and peanut oil are permissible, as peanuts are not actually legumes. Some Ashkenazic authorities permit, while others forbid, the use of legumes in a form other than their natural state, for example, corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil. Sephardic authorities permit the use of all of the above. Consult your Rabbi for guidance in the use of these products.

PERMITTED FOODS:

A. The following foods require no kosher le-Pesach label if purchased prior to Pesach: Unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives: (However, be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not kosher for Passover unless marked KP); sugar, pure tea; salt (not iodized); pepper, natural spices, frozen fruit juices with no additives; frozen (uncooked) vegetables (for legumes see above), milk; butter; cottage cheese; cream cheese, ripened cheeses such as cheddar (hard), muenster (semi-soft) and camembert (soft); frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives); baking soda.

All about kashering: From utensils and plates to the kitchen sink

- B. The following foods require no kosher le-Pesach label if purchased before or during Pesach. Fresh fruits and vegetables (for legumes see above), eggs, fresh fish and fresh meat.
- C. The following foods require a kosher le-Pesach label if purchased before or during Pesach: All baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices (these juices are often clarified with kitniyot which are not listed among the ingredients. However, if one knows there are no such agents, the juice may be purchased prior to Pesach without a kosher le-Pesach label); canned tuna (since tuna, even when packed in water, has often been processed in vegetable broth and/or hydrolyzed protein; however, if it is known that the tuna is packed exclusively in water, without any additional ingredients or additives, it may be purchased without a kosher le-Pesach label); wine, vinegar, liquor, oils, dried fruits, candy, chocolate flavored milk, ice cream, yogurt and soda.
- D. The following processed foods (canned, bottled or frozen), require a kosher le-Pesach label if purchased during Pesach: milk, butter, juices, vegetables, fruit, milk products, spices, coffee, tea, and fish, as well as all foods listed in Category C.

DETERGENTS: If permitted during the year, powdered and liquid detergents do not require a kosher le-Pesach label.

MEDICINE: Since chametz binders are used in many pills, the following guidelines should be followed: If the medicine is required for life sustaining therapy, it may be used on Pesach. If it is not for life sustaining therapy, some authorities permit, while others prohibit. Consult your Rabbi. In all cases, capsules are preferable.

KASHERING OF UTENSILS: The process of kashering utensils depends on how the utensils are used. According to halakhah, leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil (ke-voleo kakh poleto). Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

- A. EARTHENWARE: (china, pottery, etc.) may not be kashered. However, fine translucent chinaware which has not been used for over a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.
- B. METAL: (wholly made of metal) utensils used in fire (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made as hot as possible. Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and completely immersed in boiling water. Pots should have water boiled in them which will overflow the rim. The utensils should not be used for a period of at least 24 hours between the cleaning and the immersion in boiling water. Metal baking utensils cannot be kashered.
- C. OVENS AND RANGES: Every part that comes in contact with food must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned. The oven and range should be heated as hot as possible for a half hour. If there is a broil setting, use it. Self-cleaning ovens should be scrubbed and cleaned and then put through the self-cleaning cycle. Continuous cleaning ovens must be kashered in the same manner as regular ovens. MICROWAVE OVENS which do not cook the food by means of heat, should be cleaned, and then a cup of water should be placed inside. Then the oven should be turned on until the water disappears. A microwave oven that has a browning element cannot be kashered for Pesach.
- D. GLASSWARE: Authorities disagree as to the method for kashering drinking utensils. One opinion requires soaking in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours. The other opinion requires only a thorough scrubbing before Pesach, or putting them through a dishwasher.
- E. DISHWASHER: After not using the machine for a period of 24 hours, a full cycle with detergent should be run.
- F. ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES: If the parts that come into contact with chametz are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way (if metal, follow the rules or metal utensils). If the parts are not removable, the appliance cannot be kashered. (All exposed parts should be thoroughly cleaned.)
- G. TABLES, CLOSETS AND COUNTERS: If used with chametz, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used.
- H. KITCHEN SINK: A metal sink can be kashered by thoroughly cleaning and then pouring boiling water over it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. If, however, dishes are to be soaked in a porcelain sink, a dish basin must be used.
- I. CHAMETZ AND NON-PASSOVER UTENSILS: Non-Passover dishes, pots and chametz whose ownership has been transferred, should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.
