Jeremy Dauber is the Atran Professor of Yiddish Language, Literature, and Culture at Columbia University. He also serves as Director of Columbia University's Institute for Israel and Jewish Studies. Jeremy received his undergraduate degree summa cum laude from Harvard and his doctorate from the University of Oxford, which he attended as a Rhodes Scholar.

Jeremy's books include Jewish Comedy. A Serious History, American Comics: A History, In the Demon's Bedroom. Yiddish Literature and the Early Modern; Antonio's Devils. Writers of the Jewish Enlightenment and the Birth of Modern Hebrew and Yiddish Literature; and The Worlds of Sholem Aleichem. Jeremy frequently lectures on topics related to Jewish literature, history, humor, and popular culture.

A colleague of mine once explained change in a synagogue as learning to "inflict pain at a tolerable pace." The first time I heard that definition, I couldn't help but laugh (you probably are too). Now, however, I realize how prescient and wise he was in sharing that sentiment.



Synagogues and institutions in general are conditioned to be "change adverse." We are, after all, one of the last repositories of reverence for tradition left in American society. As the world moves a mile a second, all of us seek out comfort and familiarity in our spiritual home. Whether it is familiar ritual, food, or company, a congregant once likened our beloved Etz Chaim to the Jewish version of "Cheers" (a show that, for the record, I have only seen in syndication). In our unique community largely consisting of transplants, we all chose once upon a time to make our home in a strange place and to create comfort in the familiar. At times, we wear our Etz Chaim like a warm tallit that we place over our heads during *duchening* on the holidays and never want to take it off.

Yet even beloved institutions cannot shut themselves off to the changing ways of the world. Nowhere does this lesson come into perspective better than as we approach Chanukah. Every Chanukah, we tell ourselves a myth about the bravery of the Maccabees as Jewish purists who rejected change entirely. We then regale our children with tales about how the Greek culture of the period threatened the very existence of Judaism.

Only here now, according to most historians, is the real picture of Chanukah: The rabbis of the time period, and the Maccabees themselves, were in fact, immersed in Greek culture and even spoke the language, as did most of the Jews living in the Land of Israel. It's just that like Jews throughout every period of our history, the Jews of the Maccabean period had to make decisions about what kinds of changes were tolerable and which ones were not.

Most of Greek culture was a de facto way of life. But in the Book of the Maccabees in the apocrypha, we read about some rather painful changes that would not stand. Jews were choosing to "uncircumcise themselves" so that they could participate in the nude in the Greek *gymnasia*. And the Greeks, in an act expressing their religious and cultural dominance, placed a statue of Zeus in the Jerusalem Temple. These were painful changes that the Maccabees could not endure, and so they chose to revolt. Something tells me that we would draw the line here too.

As a rabbi, I recognize that the nearly six-hundred families in our synagogue all negotiate tensions surrounding change differently, especially when it comes to our decisions about our families and our community. Some want more change. Others want a little less. Yet rather than seeing weakness in this tension, Chanukah urges us to celebrate this authentic struggle that is nothing new to our history. We all know the joke about how many Jews it takes to screw in a lightbulb (punchline has to do with as many as there are different opinions about how to change it).

As conservative Jews who seek to balance tradition and change, Chanukah challenges us to define what each of us views as our "tolerable pace". No doubt, as a community, we will continue to explore what this tolerable pace looks like for all of us together.

That is what I have been told and that is what I have always found to be true.



"Adapt or die" is another catchy

phrase that comes to mind along these lines, originally credited to Charles Darwin, but also said by Brad Pitt (playing Billy Beane) in the film "Moneyball".

We have lived and learned this lesson on a global, local, and personal level for generations.

Our biggest challenge is not that we don't or can't change; it's that we usually do it kicking and screaming. We must at some point recognize the fact that things will happen that we have to adapt to regardless of whether we like it or not. So rather than spend the energy being negative about the change, seize the moment and embrace it.

When I arrived at Etz Chaim, I told Ellen Feldser, our bookkeeper, that she had to give me 5 years' notice before she retired.

Unfortunately, she did not stick to my plan and only gave me 5 months' notice.

On December 30, 2022 (the 31st is a Saturday), Ellen will turn off her computer for the last time and retire from her bookkeeping position of 26 years. Technically, she is not going anywhere. She was a member before she started working here and she will continue in that role. She just won't have to deal with me on a regular basis.

I have worked with many people during my career, but I have never worked with anyone who was more devoted to her work and her employer than Ellen. Her attention to detail and meticulous nature is beyond compare. Someone else will fill her role, but nobody will be able to replace her.

Hopefully you will all join us on Sunday, December 4, at 10:30 a.m. as we honor Ellen with a celebratory brunch in the Hammer-Tritt Social Hall. There is no charge, but we do ask for everyone to RSVP:

Follow-Up to my 2022/5783 Kol Nidre Speech

At this point all of you have heard me mention that I am a "Say It Out Loud" kind of gal. During my speech I showed you the plaque that my co-worker gave me a few years ago as a gift. (If you have not seen/heard my speech,

it's available on the Congregation Etz Chaim Facebook page -October 4 - Mincha Service/Kol Nidre (I start at 1:22:37.)

One thing I wanted to "say out loud" in my Kol Nidre speech, but did not have time to address with clarity, is the Congregation Etz Chaim Social Contract. It was printed on Page 5 of Etz Chaim Sisterhood Greeting and Remembrance Book and shown below.

The Social Contract was created by our VP of Communications, Audrey Fried-Sheets, and was adopted by our Board of Trustees as a road map for our interactions while Creating Meaningful Jewish Experiences at Congregation Etz Chaim. There are six "points" like those on a <u>Magen David</u>. Each point addresses a value held by our community that we want to highlight in all our interactions. We've included examples or suggestions of each of these points to express more clearly how these values are important to us.

<u>Kedusha/Holiness</u> – embrace everyone without regard to background, age, ability, race, gender, sexual orientation, marital status, gender identity, or socio-economic status. In this regard, you might have noticed that we recently replaced our "Safe Zone" stickers on our synagogue doors. We always had this sticker on the front door of the building, but it was old and faded. In preparation for our Pride Shabbat on October 22, we refreshed these stickers on the front door, the education wing door, and the Eden/King administrative wing door. I am so proud that our congregation serves as a "Safe Zone", especially in light of the recent shooting in Colorado.

<u>Yosher/Honesty</u> – Promote open and honest communication that allows us to address our differences constructively. Not everyone has the same political and social beliefs. We have a diverse and

growing congregation. It is exceedingly important that we can communicate respectfully with each other to learn about each other's choices so we can work together towards understanding. The goal is not to persuade everyone to be the same. The goal is to support and learn about our differences.


<u>Tzedek/Justice</u> – Engage in behaviors that protect the vulnerability of others. Act with moral integrity. Avoid creating a power imbalance or an intimidating, offensive, abusive, or hostile environment for fellow congregants and professional staff. It should not need to be "said out loud" that everyone deserves to be treated with respect and kindness.

Shmirat HaLashon v'Etzbaot/Speaking and Writing with Care – Recognize the power of our verbal and written speech (including social media) and use it to build up, rather than harm, members of our Synagogue Family. With so many sources and methods of communication, we need to be mindful of what we say, where we say it, and how it could be perceived. Don't spread gossip or rumors. Make sure you have correct information when you share. It you aren't sure, use my motto . . . when in doubt, check it out!

<u>Rachamim/Compassion</u> – Treat one another with respect, dignity, fairness, and compassion. You never know what's going on in someone's life. When you act with compassion in every interaction, you know you are always doing the right thing.

<u>Kavod/Honor</u> – Fulfill our financial agreement made with the synagogue. During my Kol Nidre speech I explained that WE NEED YOU, our congregants. We need you physically (in the building, participating in Etz Chaim, and sharing our world) and we need you financially. Each of us plays a role in the financial health of our congregation. We need everyone to meet their financial commitments, so we can retain our viability. It takes all of us together.

As we move into the calendar year of 2023 and my second year as President of this outstanding congregation, I just want to say out loud how grateful I am for everyone's support, involvement, dedication, and love for this community. Congregation Etz Chaim is a vibrant and diverse group and we are so fortunate to be connected to each other.

As part of the B'nai Mitzvah experience, our students are required to do a mitzvah project to help them understand their role as adults in the Jewish world. We've known all along that doing mitzvot should not be a one-time event because the more we perform mitzvot, the more inclined we are to

continue to do so in the future. To that end, one piece of our 7th grade curriculum this year is service learning. The students have discussed a variety of ways they can be helpful to others, planned out the activities they have done or intend to do, and then are responsible for the implementation of those activities. Thus far, Kitah Zayin, our 7th graders, have made weighted neck rolls for the MDE school, including cutting out the fabric, sewing it together, and stuffing it. The class presented these neck rolls to Mindy Elkan a few weeks ago. And they haven't stopped there. Because we are so fortunate to have our entire school able to participate in the Backpack Buddies program organized by Lauren Surden and Angie Nothdurft, our 7th graders have done their share of packing the bags. Every class in our Religious School will have a chance to pack the bags and thus far, Kitah Bet, 2nd grade, and Kitah Vav, 6th grade students, have had the privilege of doing so. In addition, Kitah Vav, 6th traveled to JF&CS to help sort out the kosher food donated during the High Holiday season. The class sorted 15 barrels of food, which was equivalent to 3000 pounds of food!!

As we move out of our Jewish Holiday season and into a more secular holiday time, we often hear our preschoolers say things like, "I'm not Christmas, I'm Chanukah". We, as preschool educators, try to not only make our children feel the specialness of being Jewish, but also we find a way to show the children perhaps a deeper, more spiritual connection to the holiday of Chanukah. We explain to them the beauty of light. That each one of us has a

special light that shines within us that makes us unique and important. We look at the Shamash, the Helper Candle, and we too try to emulate the job of the special candle. 





Introducing Etz Chaim "West"



There are more Yidden in Woodstock than you would imagine! When we met our new banker at the Truist branch near us, she was Jewish! When we thought about moving to Woodstock, I went through the synagogue directory looking for any addresses in Woodstock, Acworth, or Kennesaw, and actually, there were quite a few!

Etz Chaim West is the name given to a fledgling chavurah from Etz Chaim, made up of people who live in the areas mentioned above. We have met for an initial get together. It was a Friday night Oneg Shabbat with about 18 people. The discussion that night led us to set up a Tashlich service at Old Rope Mill Park on the banks of Little River. We were a small group of 8, but we cast our bread on the water together and watched it float away.

As you face your Chanukiah (menorah), place the candles in their holders from right to left. As you light them, you light them from left to right, starting with the newest candle.

The candles should be kindled after nightfall. The menorah should be placed near the window for all to see, safely away from curtains and shades.

On the sixth night of Chanukah, **Friday, December 23**, the Chanukah candles are kindled **before nightfall and before the Shabbat candles.** On the seventh night of Chanukah, **Saturday, December 24**, the Chanukah candles are kindled **after Havdalah**.

Chanukah Blessings

Recite after the Shamash, the Helper candle, is lit but before the other candles are lit.

Art for a Mitzvah

In June my husband and I participated in Etz Chaim's trip to Israel. One of the places we toured in Jerusalem was Yad LaKashish, which means "Lifeline for the Old". It was founded in 1962 when Israel was only 14 years old. Myriam Mendilow opened a small bookbinding workshop where eight local elderly men were trained in the craft. Today Yad LaKashish is a thriving place with ten workshops and serves nearly 300 elderly immigrants and artisans. They produce an array of items that are sold in their gift shop and online. The proceeds are invested back into the operation to help with support of the immigrants who work there and call Israel their home. We were able to see almost every workshop and found happy, engaged, busy people who were creating lovely and appealing works of art and craft.

I was completely in awe and was so taken with appreciation for the people, their capabilities, independence, and commitment to making beautiful handmade items. I was also so inspired that I thought we could do a similar type of program at Etz Chaim. Once home, I continued to think about this for a long time, talked it through with some people, and came up with an idea. With complete support and encouragement from Rabbi Dorsch we now have a similar program of our own that's ready to roll out at Etz Chaim called "Art for a Mitzvah".

Members of our community are invited to sign up to make a beautiful art piece that will be displayed and sold within the congregation. Half of the proceeds will be used as a donation and the other half will be invested back into this program. Any and all who would like to share a craft or art creation are also invited to lead a project.

The goal is to develop a self-sustaining program wherein all involved perform this mitzvah and at the same time feel happy, engaged, creative, self-satisfied, and involved with a sense of purpose and belonging. This is open to all Etz Chaim members.

Yad LaKashish was inspired by one of the pillars of tzedakah...helping others help themselves. Please join me in the start of this program as we make our first act of mitzvot and tzedakah be a donation to Yad LaKashish.

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL BRICK GARDEN AT ETZ CHAIM

Even if you've seen the beautiful Memorial Garden – it's to the left of the main entrance – you may not be aware of its storied history. Begun as a Holocaust Memorial, the Synagogue was fortunate to receive amazing historic relics from the Holocaust Museum in Washington, D.C., including **railroad tracks** from the **Treblinka concentration camp** and **paving stones** from the **Warsaw Ghetto**.

After falling into some disrepair, Men's Club undertook the garden's restoration. In addition to redesign, painting and landscaping, the project included building a display case for an 18th century **Czechoslovakian Torah Scroll**, previously destined for display in a Nazi museum 'dedicated to the extinct Jewish community'.


The Garden is enhanced with engraved Memorial Bricks dedicated to a loved one... **not restricted to Victims of the Holocaust**. As part of our Congregation's meaningful relationship with the Catholic Church of St. Ann, the Memorial Garden was rededicated in a joint Holocaust Remembrance Day Service in 2012.

Boosted by a vibrant Bricks-and-Books program, purchases of Memorial Bricks enabled us to send seven youth from our two faith communities to the Holocaust Museum in Washington, D.C., just last year; we would like to sponsor more Etz Chaim/St. Ann Youth Missions funded by the additional brick purchases.

We are also interested in furthering Holocaust education to Cobb County student groups by offering docent-led tours of our Garden and artifacts.

We encourage members to purchase a beautiful brick as a commemoration for a loved one. The cost is \$100, and the order form can be downloaded from the synagogue website at <u>www.etzchaim.net/mens-club</u> and clicking the link "printable brick order form" under the heading, **Holocaust Garden Memorial Brick Program**.

Etz Chaim continues to collect food for the JF&CS Kosher Food Pantry. Right now, they are low on the following items:






