First came an announcement letting customers know that the store's security cameras were "live and activated". I then watched as the store manager approached two young women shopping in my aisle. "Ladies, do you need anything?" she asked.



It should not have taken a genius in that moment to figure out what was happening. As

the two young women lined up with a full backpack to pay at the drugstore, the manager was more direct. She whispered a little more loudly than necessary: "I want to let you know that we have you on camera putting items into your backpack. If you go through the mechanism, the alarm will go off."

Not looking particularly surprised, the young ladies looked at one another. I then watched uncomfortably as they paid with two five-dollar bills for some candy. They attempted to walk out of the store. The alarms blared.

Why is it that when we are on the wrong path, or in the middle of making a mistake, we are unable to pull ourselves out of it? Why, when we are given multiple opportunities to do *teshuva*, and to turn back, do we continue heading in the wrong direction?

Sometimes, it is because we fail to see the signs that we are headed in the wrong direction. As I watched several red flags transpire at the store, I couldn't help but think of the story of Balaam ben Beor. In the Book of Numbers, Balaam is hired by King Balak of Moab to curse the Israelites. He journeys out. Three times the donkey he is riding skirts from the pathway into a field. Only rather than wondering what is wrong with his otherwise reliable animal, he strikes him until he turns back to the path. The Torah tells us that the donkey was able to see the angel with its sword ready to strike Balaam, had he continued forward on his wicked path. Balaam, in his myopia, is unable to see that warning sign. Neither could our shoplifters.

Yet it may also be because in life's series of successes and failures, it is only when we hit rock bottom—experiencing harmful consequences of our actions — that we turn back. This is a very common tendency among family members of people who suffer substance abuse problems. Not wanting to see a loved one suffer, they provide them with a place to stay, money, and other resources to keep afloat. Unfortunately, while no doubt helpful, this safety net enables them to keep abusing because they fail to face any consequences. Once abusers are "cut off" and hit rockbottom, they face the consequences. They have a stronger chance of pulling themselves back up. All of us, and I suspect our shoplifters, share that experience when we are enabled or choose to enable others.

Over the past several months, I haven't been able to stop thinking about our shoplifters. In that moment, far away at Shoppers Drug Mart in Winnipeg, I am not sure I would've been a good rabbi for them.

But in this new year, I do want to be that rabbi for all of you who may be struggling. Echoing the words of the store manager, I want to ask: "What do you need?" Let this bulletin column to be that angel with the sword, or that "being caught on camera moment", for you to take a pause and wonder why you still feel like you are going in the wrong direction.

This New Year season, there are many things we ought to remember. But foremost, let us remember the gift of *teshuva*: that you are never "in too deep" to turn around, to make that change in your life, or to return those items to the shelf and begin again.

Marathon Season

In the Winter of 2011, I did something I never in a million years thought I would do: I ran a half marathon. Now I know that there are some running enthusiasts in our community, and I am sure you have run multiple half marathons, have even run a



full marathon, and must absolutely love it! I made sure I am not one of those people - I would even say that I hate running. Ok, maybe I only dislike it, but if you give me a workout option to do, running would be one of my last picks. However, I decided to sign up because it was to raise money for a good cause (the Crohn's and Colitis Foundation), and if I am being honest, it meant a trip to Vegas to run down the strip at night.

As this was my first long distance run of my life, I knew I needed to prepare greatly, especially since I am missing an ACL in my left knee, which also has a surgically prepared meniscus. So I read all the articles and joined some apps which helped beginning runners build up to running longer distances. If I was going to do this, I was going to be committed. So I start to build up slowly by walking and then running. Jogging, then running. Then I set some distance goals for myself, and I even remember the first time I ever ran a 5k distance. I felt like I was on my way.

However, as I continued to run, I began to let my distaste for the activity start to creep into my training. I recall that once I had run about 8 or 9 miles, I said to myself, "I got this. I do not have to keep going through this *verkakte* training program." So while I still ran, I never made it to running a full half marathon until my actual race. Oy, was that a mistake - by mile 9, I was starting to wane and it did not help that this was the most boring part of the course we were running. Then my leg started to cramp, and I began to think that I was nuts for not having prepared more for this large task.

Why do I bring this up to you all in this article? We as Jews across the world, and definitely rabbis, are about to enter our marathon season. We are about to celebrate all of the holidays of Tishrei, starting with Rosh Hashanah and then ending with Sukkot. These holidays really are like a marathon, not only because it consists of a lot of coming to shul (), but because they are meant to really be a time of introspection, a time to think of our actions as they relate to each other and to the world. They are meant for us to actively engage and think back to the experiences of our ancestors from the wandering and establishing small booths to dwell in to recreating the walking around the Temple while grasping onto the lulav and etrog. These holidays are a true spiritual marathon.

However, just like training for a real marathon, we cannot just jump into the holidays and expect that we will obtain the high spiritual and emotional connection unless we do our religious training regimen. Luckily for us, our tradition had the foresight to realize that we as individuals need this type of program to better prepare for the High Holiday season. That is where the month of Elul comes to help us, which started just a few days ago at the end of August.

The customs that we are supposed to do to prepare for the forthcoming holidays are to recite *selichot*, or penitential prayers, which are prayers that are supposed to ask Hashem to show us favor in His eyes and to forgive us for those things we have done that have not been aligned with His will and mitzvot.

The rationale behind this is that our tradition says that Moses went up to Sinai to receive the second set of tablets at the beginning of Elul and then returned with them 40 days later, which would be Yom Kippur. By saying these prayers, we are beginning to do the work of introspection with the culmination being the holidays.

We also begin to hear the blowing of the shofar. I am sure many of us have heard that the shofar blast is meant to be like an alarm clock waking us up to be ready for the holidays. But also I think to really understand the true majestic nature of the sound of the shofar, we need to begin to hear it sooner than just the holidays. If we hear it on the holidays alone, it can almost be jarring or alarming. However, if we hear it several times before, we can come to appreciate the timber and tone of each blast, which in my opinion reverberates down to our inner core and soul.

It is through these practices and the recitation of Psalm 27 that allow us to really cross the finish line of the Holiday marathon confidently - way more confidently and easier than I did when I completed my Las Vegas marathon many years ago.

So I hope you will take this spiritual training and suggestions to heart so that you can experience the holidays in a more meaningful and uplifting way. Join me on Wednesday, September 7, at 7:00 p.m. as I lead a discussion on *Struggling with the Concept of God*. See page 14 for more information.

I planned to write a completely different piece for this month's Voice of Chaim. However, this week, Michael Shinners, a colleague and friend for decades, was shot and killed while at work in a midtown condominium building. I am attending his funeral this weekend. Sometimes I believe the trite statements about my "season", "age", and "stage". Other times I am angered by them. Michael Shinners was 60 years young with an infectiously wide smile, a witty sense of humor, a curious mind, and a kind heart. I am fortunate. I got to see Michael in a recent class I taught. I got to banter with him, give him a hug, and tell him how much I appreciated him. It should not have been my last memory of Michael.

I feel sad, angry, and (sometimes) helpless. I also feel connected, motivated, and empowered. In attending all these funerals, going to evening shivas, providing a meal, and contributing money, I am reminded to make sure I stay **connected** to the important people in my life. I am **motivated** to make plans to see those who don't live nearby. I am **empowered** to make sure my loved ones know how I feel about them. I am so fortunate to have so many significant relationships in my life. . . my family, my close friends from childhood, college, and my Etz Chaim family-by-choice, my work colleagues who have grown up with me, and so many more. I am so blessed to be surrounded by people who nourish my soul and fill me up with love and support.

Instead of choosing sadness, anger, or helplessness, I choose to stay connected, motivated, and empowered. I choose to make sure the people in my life know what an important role they play in my mental health and my well-being. I don't assume these people know their impact. I make sure to SAY IT OUT LOUD to tell them verbally, in texts, and in hand-written notes how much their presence in my world keeps me afloat. We all need "our people", and I am grounded every single day by mine.

As we prepare for the High Holidays, as we apologize for all the times we've missed the mark over the last year, as we pray to be inscribed in the Book of Life for the next year, take time to make sure those you love know it and feel it. Don't assume they know it. Don't assume they feel it. SAY IT OUT LOUD. Make sure you make your message heard. Nourish their soul and fill them up with your love and support.

I will be attending another funeral this weekend for a friend and colleague who impacted my world in a positive way. I am grateful that the last time I saw him, I made sure he knew it.

May you and your family have a meaningful, healthy, happy, and sweet new year and may all of us be inscribed in the book of life for 5783.

As we enter into this new school year with the High Holidays at the end of the month, it's a perfect confluence of acknowledging our strong and competent 7th graders (both girls and boys) who we will celebrate this year and the time of returning to our better selves. This month is Elul, which is associated with preparation. Specifically, preparation for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. As a kid, you were along for the ride, which always included amazing food and meshugeneh family. As an adult, it's a little different. It can be stressful and hard work organizing and planning for the High Holidays. But even deeper than that, we prepare to deep dive into our own psyche.

Introspection is the process in which you self-observe the opinions you may have and decide what to do with them as a means of guidance in decision making. The examination of one's mental processes is extremely important for building and sustaining relationships. How you respond to your loved ones says a lot about your inner biases, like your pet peeves and red flags. These biases help protect our mental health - it's a survival tactic. But sometimes they get in the way of building our relationships. My suggestion would be simply observing your own behavior and taking note of how you respond to others. Is it my first gut reaction that I'm acting on or do I think about how I'm feeling before I speak? By studying your process of thoughts into action, you can start to understand yourself more. Plus, as you take your thoughts inward, you come in close contact with your consciousness, helping you weigh your options before responding. This process of conscious-driven decision making can be built through introspection.

I don't have to tell you that this can be hard and even a little scary to think about. What if I find something I don't like about myself? But remember, analyzing our missteps give us the opportunity to learn about ourselves and grow. Golda Meir said it best: "Trust yourself. Create the kind of self that you will be happy to live with all your life. Make the most of yourself by fanning the tiny, inner sparks of possibility into flames of achievement." Achievements include the obvious ones, like career success, but achievements like "oh, wow instead of yelling and fighting, I was able to act in a way that got what I wanted without conflict" also exist! So, my wish for you this Elul is that you can start to create your happiest self, whatever that may look like. That's the biggest achievement of all.







CODE OF CONDUCT

Arrival/Dismissal

All participants are expected to arrive before the start of each program and be picked up after each program concludes. If any parent must pick up their child early, they should reach out to the Youth Director and/or Advisor(s) in a timely fashion. If any child is being picked up by an adult other than their own parent or sibling, the Youth Director must receive written notice, whether through email or a signed letter provided at drop-off. USYers of driving age are not allowed to drive during any program.

Behavior

All Youth Department participants are to treat each other with respect and dignity. At no time will any derogatory remarks toward one another be tolerated.

Hukei Habayit (House Rules)

With the understanding that we have different participants who are setup for success in different ways, we ask that no pets are brought into the Bayit, unless a specific activity/program asks for them. All food brought into the Etz Chaim Bayit must be marked kosher or approved by the Youth Director or Rabbi. Participants will not be allowed to leave their program unless the Advisor(s)/Youth Director deem the Bayit cleaned. In the spirit of fostering independence, we ask that Parents, unless in an official volunteer capacity, do not join us during programs.

Dress Codes

The dress code will vary from program to program. It is mandatory, however, that all those who identify as male, while in the Synagogue, wear kippot. While in the Sanctuary, everyone must have their shoulders covered. Shorts, skirts and skorts must be an appropriate length. Shirts cannot show midriff, back or cleavage and must be free of inappropriate language or insignia. Tank top straps must be two fingers in width.
