Rabbi Dan Dorsch

It's hard to believe that Israel turned 75. I remember when Israel turned 50 and I attended festivities in downtown Philadelphia. No doubt some of you reading this bulletin remember the miracle of when Israel became a state in 1948.



Here is my theology surrounding Israel. There are Jews who talk about the need to build a Third Temple. For me, it's already happened: the modern State of Israel is our Third Temple. She is reyshit tzmichat geulataynu, the beginning of the dawn of our redemption. As we speak about the glamor of a rebuilt Jerusalem in our prayers, we behold the beauty and splendor of a rebuilt Israel in our day. An old joke making the rounds is that the national bird of Israel is "the crane". Israel is the only place with more new construction than Atlanta. She is increasingly rebuilt.

The Messianic era, which sees Israel as ushering in a time of peace in the world, won't happen on its own. All of us have a role to play in building a better Israel that will usher in a better world. To this end, our synagogue offers a manifold number of opportunities for connecting with Israel.

Etz Chaim is a proudly Zionist community, and we demonstrate that in different ways. We support Israel's sacrosanct right to its defense through robust AIPAC involvement, and we support its growth as a religiously pluralistic society by serving as a "check off congregation" for our Masorti (Conservative) movement in Israel. Several of our congregants are employed at the Jewish National Fund, and I proudly serve on its board as a "rabbi for Israel." Many of us contribute to Friends of the IDF, Federation-Israel Campaigns, and any number of pro-Israel organizations. We welcome speakers from Israel, as we did when we welcomed Rabbi Arie Hasit, Dean of the Schechter Rabbinical Seminary, last month as we celebrated Israel's Independence. Finally, we are blessed to have a number of Israelis in our preschool and our congregation and members of our own families who have made Aliyah, increasing our family connections to the Jewish state.

It is hard to believe that for most of Jewish history Jews lived without a Jewish state. I, for one, at forty years old, am blessed to take for granted never having known a world without one.

Israel is at 75 still a young country. To continue to shine, she needs our support.

With this in mind: however you may connect, find a way this month to connect to Israel.

Never Have I Ever (Etz Chaim edition)

When you Google "Never Have I Ever", a few different listings show up. There is a link to a Netflix series, links to a bunch of different YouTube videos, and a link about a drinking game. The drinking game is simple. Each person takes a turn making a statement about something they have never done. For example, one person in the game says, "never have I ever been to Israel." If anyone in the group has done the thing mentioned (i.e., been to Israel), they have to take a drink.

I am not advocating for the drinking part of this game. However, I love the concept of identifying something you've never done and figuring out who <u>has</u> done that same thing (or something similar) so they can help guide you. During my Presidency of Congregation Etz Chaim I have done many things for the first time. This past month, April 2023, included a few of these "never have I ever" moments for me. Gratefully, I had a lot of help from people who had done the same or similar things and could help guide me.

In my personal life and law practice I have purchased, sold, refinanced, and been the closing attorney for hundreds of real estate transactions. Until Tuesday, April 11, 2023, **NEVER HAVE I EVER BOUGHT A CHURCH!** Below is a photo of Rabbi Dorsch, Marty Gilbert, and me at the real estate closing where Congregation Etz Chaim officially re-purchased what I am now calling the "FRONT FIVE" (acres).

NEVER HAVE I EVER BOUGHT A CHURCH, and I did not do it alone. Our entire congregation can "take a drink" because we did this together.

The original idea for my **NEVER HAVE I EVER** challenge was about reading Torah. Other than my adult B'nai Mitzvah at Etz Chaim in February 1997, I have read Torah only three times. The last time (in 2014) was the worst. I was ready. I knew my Torah portion. I stepped up to the lower Bimah. I completely froze. I could not read. I could

not pronounce any of the words. I could not remember the trope. It was Yom Kippur. The Radow Sanctuary, Phillip's Library, the classrooms on the Feibel hallway, and the Hammer-Tritt Social Hall were packed. It was awful.

NEVER HAVE I EVER felt the need to make a personal "Torah reading come-back" and I decided to do it while serving as Etz Chaim President. I was insanely nervous after I challenged myself, but I had a lot of help preparing to read on April 22, 2023. Audrey Fried-Sheets helped me (loosely) translate the Hebrew to English so I had a clue what I was reading. Allison Saffran, Fern Meharg, and Rabbi Dorsch made recordings for me, so I could listen to the cadence of the trope and hear the nuances of the words from different people. Rabbi Dorsch gave me a photograph of the Torah portion from the actual Torah I would use and Bob Frohlich provided me an opportunity to practice from that Torah. Finally, my husband, Jonathan listened to my Torah portion so often I am sure he memorized it! **NEVER HAVE I EVER** made a Torah-reading come-back, and I did not do it alone. After services, I "took a drink" (during our Kiddush luncheon)!

After reading Torah last month, I announced a **NEVER HAVE I EVER (Etz Chaim edition)** challenge to the congregation. (You can see/hear me read Torah and announce this challenge on the livestream of our April 22, 2023, Shabbat morning services on the Congregation Etz Chaim Virtual Kiddush Facebook page, my Torah reading and challenge being at 1:54:40.)

This is my challenge to all of you: find a NEVER HAVE I EVER moment for yourself. Find something you've never done at Etz Chaim and make it happen. Come to morning or evening minyan for the first time. Volunteer for Backpack Buddies. Donate money to one of our many funds. Lead a service. Play on the Etz Chaim softball team (or show up to cheer them on). Submit a message to the Sisterhood High Holiday greeting and memorial book. Attend Shabbat services. Donate blood through our Social Action Committee. Send a mishloach manot bag. Come to a Torah study session. Paint with the Prime Timers. Attend a Lilmode event. Contribute to our Kol Nidre campaign. Join us for Shabbat in the Park. Pick something . . . pick anything related to Etz Chaim and do it for the first time.

Play NEVER HAVE I EVER (Etz Chaim edition). Let me know how it goes. I really want to hear from you!

"Two Giants of the 20th Century and the 5,000 Schools they Built that Changed America"

As I began researching Booker T. Washington over a decade ago, it reminded me that as a student in public school I never knew or understood the difference between him and George Washington Carver. I knew one of them had something to do with peanuts and the other one, well I'm not sure what I knew about him. As a matter of fact, I'm not really sure if either of these two gentlemen were ever discussed by any of my teachers. I attended public school in a small central Florida town whose major business was cattle and citrus.

Approximately 10 years ago when I got involved in a Rosenwald School project in Cave Spring, GA., I learned what Booker T. Washington's legacy was all about. He was one of the last great African American "change makers" who was born into slavery. Washington was cultured and committed to enhancing the lives of African American children. Fundraising was a skill set that he acquired. **No one** was beyond his reach - neither Presidents nor members of America's richest families, i.e., the Vanderbilts, Fords, Astors and the ROSENWALDS. He and Julius Rosenwald became close friends, and on his first visit to see Tuskegee, Rosenwald became a member of the Board of Trustees.






