One of the prized haggadot I have in a somewhat extensive collection is the Moss Haggadah. This rather large volume was given to Amy and me as a wedding present from my childhood rabbi.

Illustrated by the renowned Jewish artist David Moss, the Haggadah contains all sorts of unique designs and images, some based on historical manuscripts.

The Haggadah contains many interesting pages. But my favorite page in the Haggadah is one full of tiny mirrors (I love showing this to preschoolers). The mirrors are interspersed with depictions of our ancestors dressed in our various local garb throughout our history. The text on top of the page is the quote: b'chol dor vador chayav adam lirot et atzmo ke-ilu hu yatazah mimizrayim. "In every generation, a person is obligated to see him or herself as if he or she came out of Egypt."

I know that many of us have long forgotten about COVID restrictions, masking, and social distancing. However, I can't help but be struck by the current state of the world. I look in the mirror at the Haggadah, and I am sad about what I see.

It's been two years since Vladimir Putin launched his brutal war against Ukraine, which has had the side effect of limiting freedom of movement for Americans. Today a large portion of the world once thought safe for Americans are no longer places we can feel comfortable, knowing that we may be seized and thrown into prison at a moment's notice.

Today any number of countries have come out in the United Nations against the State of Israel. These are now countries that have been crossed off my bucket list.

Sadly, we've had to postpone family trips to Israel, because we want to ensure that our families get to see the entire country, and here too, our freedom of movement has become limited.

In our blessed country today, there are also forces at work that seek to limit freedom of thought. They are the illiberal lunatics on college campuses who shut down facts, and misguided teachers in schools who present misinformation. These people fail to understand that freedom for one group should mean freedom for all, rather than one coming at the expense of another.

It all sounds rather bleak. But then, I look at the Haggadah and remember that we've been down this road before.

We sometimes think we are the first generation of Jews to struggle for freedom. Only as important as the mirrors are the depictions of our ancestors.

As I see them, I remember that in every generation there has been a Pharaoh who has been defeated. I have no doubt that as we rise to the challenges of our generation, we too will be no exception.

It's hard to believe a coffee company ended up giving us one of the most widely used Passover

Haggadahs in recent history. Back in the 1930s, Maxwell House, the coffee company, decided to jump into the Haggadah game and hasn't looked back. But how did this happen? It was all about marketing.

As we know, coffee comes from beans, which historically are not allowed during Passover (recent guidance notwithstanding). However, coffee beans are technically a fruit. A marketing agency realized this and approached Maxwell House with a way to attract Jewish customers during Passover. They started throwing in a free Haggadah with their coffee during Passover to sweeten the deal for buyers. Turns out, people loved it! Over 60 million Haggadahs later, the Maxwell House Haggadah is like a Passover staple for many families – including mine.

If I think about all the holidays on the Jewish calendar, Passover is at the top of my list. The memories and traditions that I personally recall and the way that I continue to bring those traditions forward and pass them on to my children really make it special.

I love the story. Passover is a celebration of freedom, a reminder of the journey from oppression to liberation. The retelling of the Exodus story was not just a historical account, but a call to reflect on our own lives. As we recite the plagues, dip our fingers into our wine glasses (oh, that Manischewitz Heavy Malaga!), and remove drops to symbolize empathy for the suffering of our ancestors, we are encouraged to ponder the universal themes of justice, compassion, and the pursuit of freedom.

Passover is a holiday I have always spent with my family. I remember seders at Bubie's house in Seaford, NY, and sometimes my Great Aunt Thelma's in Syosset. I remember the seders we had at my parents' home in Connecticut. And the ones we've hosted in our own home here in Atlanta as adults with our own family. I remember that being together on Passover was so important, we hosted Zoom Seders during COVID, as many of you did. Now, that's commitment!

While the Seder service varies for everyone in length and depth, it always tells the same story, and the songs we sing never go out of style. And of course, there's the food. I'm going to put the matzah aside (not the afikomen just yet), as I will not admit to looking forward to that. But I can tell you, my mom's charoset is very hard to beat, and even when we can't be together for the holiday, I still find some way to get my hands on it. And to this day, my children continue to insist we hide a raisin in one of the matzo balls when cooking and celebrate the lucky recipient at dinner.

In the tapestry of my memories, Passover Seders stand out as a vibrant thread, weaving together the rich tapestry of tradition, family, and faith. The rituals, symbols, and shared stories created a sense of continuity, connecting us to our ancestors and the broader Jewish community. As we prepare for yet another Passover Seder, I am filled with gratitude for the memories of Seders past and continue to pass the traditions forward.

Oh – and enjoy some coffee with your afikomen and hit up the supermarket if you need some extra Maxwell House Haggadahs!

### What's Going on in Kitah Bet

The second grade Hebrew school class has several traditions- we do a Shabbat skit for the school, we have a scrapbook that makes the rounds to the whole class, and we do a museum. How do we create a museum? Each student picks a particular interest they have, which we merge with something Jewish. Let's say someone loves art—their topic would be Jewish art. Students are encouraged to do research

on the topic at home or with our madrichim during school and come up with a fun way to teach it at school. Creativity is encouraged.

The students are so creative, and I love seeing their 2nd grade minds at work! After the students are finished presenting their topic to their fellow classmates, they then help curate a museum. All the students present their project to their parents, siblings and other religious school grades that come to tour the museum. The students come up with a list of 10 questions they might be asked. When coming up with these questions, it might lead to more research on their topic!

Then when the big day comes, they come dressed in nice dress clothes- like Shabbat clothes - and put out their project on the table. They rehearse their answers to the questions and are prepared when the families arrive. The students always have such pride in themselves and their work. There is such meaning to the research, the preparation, the presenting, and the follow-up to each project.

Great job, 2nd graders!

Day to day, you will find the Cool Cats focusing on not only pre-reading and writing skills, but also Jewish traditions and values that help to build character and strength. The highlight of my year is to see how they have powered through the disappointments and risen to be true Cool Cats."

All three of the Cool Cat teachers are so passionate about their roles in the classroom. Gabby Ledger, another one of the teachers, said, "This group is my favorite because I love seeing the connections they make as they build on their prior knowledge. Seeing them make new observations, seek out new information, and process the knowledge they receive is absolutely amazing. They actively search for answers and are endlessly curious. They are learning what it means to not only just be curious, but to be accepting of others and what truly makes someone a good and kind person." Ju Ritter, the third Cool Cat teacher, said, "The class is made up of small people with big personalities. As a teacher, I have seen these personalities grow and flourish. I know they will take the lessons from this class with them and grow up to be wonderful people in this world."







### Spotlight on Art for a Mitzvah

Many of you are familiar with the Art for a Mitzvah program which began in January 2023. For those of you unfamiliar with the program, it came about from an inspiration after a tour of Yad LaKashish, Lifeline for the Old, in Jerusalem. The tour was part of a congregational trip to Israel with Rabbi Dorsch in June 2022. Yad LaKashish is a thriving place with 10 workshops and serves nearly 300 elderly immigrants who are natural or trained artisans. The proceeds of their worldwide sales (including ritual art pieces, jewelry, metal works, paper goods, fabrics, and children's toys) are invested back into the operation to help with the support of immigrants who call Israel their home.

Jewish art enhances ritual art pieces and lifts up the surroundings, the people who see it and use it. Jewish art enhances Jewish traditions and culture. We have so many choices we can make in our selection of menorahs, mezuzahs, candlesticks, challah plates and covers, Kiddush cups, and Seder plates to name a few. These beautiful pieces give us a connection to our history, the experience of others who came before us, and our culture. Color and art have an importance in our lives because they can embody the identity of a nation, a community, and a group of people.

Our mission for Art for a Mitzvah is to create beautiful pieces of art to enhance our homes, culture, and traditions. From there we use the sales to make a meaningful donation and to fund the next project. To date our donations have been \$630 (35 Chai) to Yad LaKashish, \$252 (14 Chai) to Backpack Buddies, and \$720 (40 Chai) to Magen David Adom.

Our next project began on March 6. Please look for our display and sales in April.






The Pride Alliance has been busy planning events for this year. Here is what you may look forward to:

Film Screening of Yentl and Discussion with Rabbi Adler: On Sunday, April 28, at 2:00 p.m., in the Hammer-Tritt Social Hall. We will be screening the award-winning movie Yentl, starring, directed, and co-written by Barbra Streisand, along with Mandy Patinkin and Amy Irving. ### THE SEARCH FOR CHAMETZ (BEDIKAT CHAMETZ)

Get a candle and start your search for chametz.

In prohibiting the use of any leaven during the week of Passover, the Torah enjoins that "leaven shall not be seen with thee in all thy borders" (Ex. XII:7) and "No leaven shall be found in your houses" (Ex. XII:19). In order that these injunctions should be fulfilled both in the letter and the spirit, the rabbis ordained that a thorough search shall be made for chametz on the night before the beginning of the festival.

The search is to be conducted by candlelight so that no corner of the house shall be overlooked and even the smallest particle of leaven removed. On the following morning all remaining chametz is to be destroyed by fire, just as in Temple times any part of an offering, which had been accidentally retained in excess of its prescribed time limit, was relegated to the fire. (Search for Chametz is Sunday night, April 21 at 8:42 p.m.)

Having thus disposed of your chametz, the following declaration of annulment is cited: "May all leaven in my possession, whether I have seen it or not, or whether I have removed it or not, be annulled, considered as dust of the earth." This absolves you from responsibility for any chametz which might accidentally have been overlooked. This is a lovely tradition to follow, one that adds to the excitement of the season. For details, consult either page 140 of the First Jewish Catalogue or any complete Passover Haggadah.

### SELLING THE CHAMETZ

Any chametz owned by a Jew during the Passover week is forbidden for actual use. If one cannot dispose of all chametz before the approach of the Passover holiday, he must arrange for a formal "MECHIRAT CHAMETZ" or sale of that chametz to a non-Jew.

All such chametz in your possession should be collected and placed in a spare room, closet or trunk and locked. All chametz dishes and utensils should also be placed in a special closet or room until after Pesach. You should then authorize the Rabbi to draw up a bill of sale and negotiate the transfer to a non-Jew. Every attempt should be made to see the Rabbi personally. If that is not possible, kindly mail the form below to Rabbi Dorsch. It must reach the Rabbi by Monday, April 22, by 10:00 a.m.

I hereby authorize Rabbi Daniel Dorsch to dispose of all my chametz, wherever it may be stored. This I do in accordance with the requirements and provisions of Jewish law.

This guide was prepared for the Rabbinical Assembly Committee on Jewish Law and Standards by Rabbi Mayer Rabinowitz. It was accepted by the Committee on December 12, 1984. The last paragraph of the introduction, as well as Part A under "Permitted Foods" have been amended to reflect more recent decisions of the Committee affecting the status of peanuts, peanut oil and certain cheeses.

The Torah prohibits the ownership of chametz (leaven) during Pesach. Therefore, we arrange for the sale of the chametz to a non-Jew. The transfer, mekhirat chametz, is accomplished by appointing an agent, usually the Rabbi, to handle the sale. It is a valid and legal transfer of ownership. At the end of the holiday, the agent arranges for the reversion of ownership of the now-permitted chametz. If ownership of the chametz was not transferred before the holiday, the use of this chametz is prohibited after the holiday as well (chametz she-avar alay ha-Pesach).

Since the Torah prohibits the eating of chametz during Pesach, and since many common foods contain some admixture of chametz, guidance is necessary when shopping and preparing for Pesach.

During the eight days of Pesach, chametz cannot lose its identity in admixture. Therefore, the minutest amount of chametz renders the whole admixture chametz and its use on Pesach is prohibited. However, during the rest of the year, chametz follows the normal rules of admixture, i.e. it loses its identity in an admixture of one-part chametz and sixty parts of non-chametz. This affords us the opportunity to differentiate between foods purchased before and during Pesach.

What follows is a general guideline. However, your Rabbi should be consulted when any doubt arises. Kosher le-Pesach labels that do not bear the name of a Rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting your Rabbi.

Prohibited foods include the following leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffees containing cereal derivatives, wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye, and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol.

As of 2015, the Conservative Movement's Committee on Jewish Law and Standards (CJLS) has permitted the eating of Kitniyot (rice and various legumes) by those of Ashkenazi lineage. For those who choose to follow this response, they may choose to keep Passover according to the Sephardic custom.

Most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods (kitniyot) to the above list: rice, corn, millet, legumes (beans and peas; however, string beans are permitted). The Committee on Jewish Law and Standards has ruled unanimously that peanuts and peanut oil are permissible, as peanuts are not actually legumes. Some Ashkenazic authorities permit, while others forbid, the use of legumes in a form other than their natural state, for example, corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil. Sephardic authorities permit the use of all of the above. Consult your Rabbi for guidance in the use of these products.

#### PERMITTED FOODS:

A. The following foods require no kosher le-Pesach label if purchased prior to Pesach: Unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives: (However, be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not kosher for Passover unless marked KP); sugar, pure tea; salt (not iodized); pepper, natural spices, frozen fruit juices with no additives; frozen (uncooked) vegetables (for legumes see above), milk; butter; cottage cheese; cream cheese, ripened cheeses such as cheddar (hard), muenster (semi-soft) and camembert (soft); frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives); baking soda.

### All about kashering: From utensils and plates to the kitchen sink

- B. The following foods require no kosher le-Pesach label if purchased before or during Pesach. Fresh fruits and vegetables (for legumes see above), eggs, fresh fish and fresh meat.
- C. The following foods require a kosher le-Pesach label if purchased before or during Pesach: All baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices (these juices are often clarified with kitniyot which are not listed among the ingredients. However, if one knows there are no such agents, the juice may be purchased prior to Pesach without a kosher le-Pesach label); canned tuna (since tuna, even when packed in water, has often been processed in vegetable broth and/or hydrolyzed protein; however, if it is known that the tuna is packed exclusively in water, without any additional ingredients or additives, it may be purchased without a kosher le-Pesach label); wine, vinegar, liquor, oils, dried fruits, candy, chocolate flavored milk, ice cream, yogurt and soda.
- D. The following processed foods (canned, bottled or frozen), require a kosher le-Pesach label if purchased during Pesach: milk, butter, juices, vegetables, fruit, milk products, spices, coffee, tea, and fish, as well as all foods listed in Category C.

DETERGENTS: If permitted during the year, powdered and liquid detergents do not require a kosher le-Pesach label.

MEDICINE: Since chametz binders are used in many pills, the following guidelines should be followed: If the medicine is required for life sustaining therapy, it may be used on Pesach. If it is not for life sustaining therapy, some authorities permit, while others prohibit. Consult your Rabbi. In all cases, capsules are preferable.

KASHERING OF UTENSILS: The process of kashering utensils depends on how the utensils are used. According to halakhah, leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil (ke-voleo kakh poleto). Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

- A. EARTHENWARE: (china, pottery, etc.) may not be kashered. However, fine translucent chinaware which has not been used for over a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.
- B. METAL: (wholly made of metal) utensils used in fire (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made as hot as possible. Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and completely immersed in boiling water. Pots should have water boiled in them which will overflow the rim. The utensils should not be used for a period of at least 24 hours between the cleaning and the immersion in boiling water. Metal baking utensils cannot be kashered.
- C. OVENS AND RANGES: Every part that comes in contact with food must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned. The oven and range should be heated as hot as possible for a half hour. If there is a broil setting, use it. Self-cleaning ovens should be scrubbed and cleaned and then put through the self-cleaning cycle. Continuous cleaning ovens must be kashered in the same manner as regular ovens. MICROWAVE OVENS which do not cook the food by means of heat, should be cleaned, and then a cup of water should be placed inside. Then the oven should be turned on until the water disappears. A microwave oven that has a browning element cannot be kashered for Pesach.
- D. GLASSWARE: Authorities disagree as to the method for kashering drinking utensils. One opinion requires soaking in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours. The other opinion requires only a thorough scrubbing before Pesach or putting them through a dishwasher.
- E. DISHWASHER: After not using the machine for a period of 24 hours, a full cycle with detergent should be run.
- F. ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES: If the parts that come into contact with chametz are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way (if metal, follow the rules or metal utensils). If the parts are not removable, the appliance cannot be kashered. (All exposed parts should be thoroughly cleaned.)
- G. TABLES, CLOSETS AND COUNTERS: If used with chametz, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used.
- H. KITCHEN SINK: A metal sink can be kashered by thoroughly cleaning and then pouring boiling water over it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. If, however, dishes are to be soaked in a porcelain sink, a dish basin must be used.
- I. CHAMETZ AND NON-PASSOVER UTENSILS: Non-Passover cishes, pots and chametz whose ownership has been transferred, should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.





### Community-Wide Yom HaShoah Observance Sunday, May 5, 2024 w Program at 11:00 a.m. Our bus will leave the Etz Chaim parking lot at 9:45 a.m.

This year marks the 59th anniversary of the first Yom HaShoah memorial service at Greenwood Cemetery in Atlanta. The Memorial to the Six Million was designed by Ben Hirsch (z"l). Ben was a nine-year-old child survivor from Frankfurt am Main, Germany, who escaped with his four older brothers on the Kindertransport to England. Their parents died in the Holocaust. Ben arrived in Atlanta in 1941 and learned English quickly, attended Atlanta public schools and graduated from Georgia Tech in Architecture. He designed churches and synagogues that have been built all over greater Atlanta, *including Congregation Etz Chaim's original building*.

The Greenwood Cemetery Memorial to the Six Million has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The money that was raised to build the memorial came primarily from the survivor community of Atlanta.

Our own Rabbi Dorsch, president of the Atlanta Rabbinical Association, will be one of the speakers at this year's Yom HaShoah ceremony. Etz Chaim's Men's Club will also be in attendance.

For those members of Etz Chaim who wish to attend but would prefer not to drive to Greenwood Cemetery, a bus has been rented for this occasion. *Seating is limited.*





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
