It's remarkable how many songs touch on the month of September. My mother's favorite song, Earth Wind and Fire's "September", talks nostalgically about "dancing the night away". Neil Diamond's "September Morn" has a similar take about the romantic intrigue of "September".

In more recent days people tend to think of another classic from Green Day's rock opera "American Idiot: Wake Me Up When September Ends". Charting a decidedly different path from the others, this song laments how September signifies the end of summer and marks the passage of time.

As Jews, there's little question that our September month tends to follow Green Day's path (even if Neil Diamond is an M.O.T.). According to our Mishna, there is not one, but four rashei shanah, new year's celebrations on our calendar. We count the age of trees by the month of Shevat, animals by Elul, and the reign of Kings according to Nissan. But the one that we celebrate as Rosh Hashanah each year is technically the one by which we measure the passage of time.

Most of the time, Rosh Hashanah falls out during September. We lament the end of summer and get prepared to welcome the new Jewish year. During August, our synagogue team gets into high gear as we prepare for the Yamim Noraim. Honey is sold online. Sermons are written. Services are coordinated. Any number of plans are made as we prepare for the "HiHos".

Alas, this year, everything feels amiss. This is because 5784 on the Jewish calendar is a leap year (literally called a shana meuberet, or a pregnant year, in Hebrew). You may recall that around March we added an entire extra month of Adar to account for the discrepancies between the moon cycles and the solar year. We do this 7 out of every 19 years, so it happens quite often.

This year, everything feels a little late. The High Holy Days won't fall until the beginning of October. Chanukah is going to continue into the year 2025. To some degree, that makes this September feel a little anticlimactic.

On the other hand, this gives us the opportunity to extend the passage of time just a little longer. Here in Georgia, we can keep our shorts on a little longer and enjoy an extended summer. We don't have to worry about holidays interrupting our fall break and cutting our Disney World trips short.

Usually, around this time of year, I am knee deep in spiritual reflection. This year, I am going to do my best "to dance the night away".

When I lived in New York City, lots of people invited me to go to the movies with them. At the time, I had really great contacts to get Broadway tickets, usually at an amazing discount. "I'll see the movies on TV when I don't live this close to Broadway," was almost always my reply.

This means that in my spare time, I'm catching up on movies that I didn't see when they were in theatres. Streaming is amazing. Especially when I compare my first computer (A Mac II in the late 1980s – no hard drive, before the internet) to what I have now (a phone that does more than that first computer did), I marvel at the technology. I'm astounded to see what people have invented—over the course of my lifetime—and how these things have changed the world.

The idea of everyone being created in the Divine Image, as we learn in Genesis Chapter 2, is an extremely important part of my personal theology and of my own relationship with God. To me, this means that the actions of the scientists, programmers, and engineers who created the software, the hardware, and things that I will probably never know the names of, are all being guided by the Divine as they come up with these incredible inventions.

And it's fantastic to benefit from these innovations. I connected my TV to the Wi-Fi, and I now can watch almost anything I want, almost any time I want. Like movies, without having to go to Blockbuster to rent a VHS. If I pick a movie that I don't like, it's no big deal. I just stop watching.

A couple weeks ago, I watched "Hidden Figures," which is about black women who worked with computers at NASA in the 1960s. These women were incredibly brilliant, and although their primary role was in helping NASA's engineers succeed in their mission of sending men into orbit and then to the moon, they also helped pave the way for computers to become what they are today. These were also women of deep faith, and I know that they counted their computational ability as a gift from God. I know I'm grateful for it!

I'm also open to recommendations of good films to stream! And yes, from time to time, I'll still go back to Manhattan to see some shows. You can count on that!

He became Vice President of Communications, Executive Vice President and ultimately President from 2006 to 2008. Bob then served as our Executive Director and Chief Operating Officer from July 2008 to June 2017. Both Reba and Bob were primary supporters of our Renewal2020 Campaign, with Bob co-chairing the project. In addition, he continues to provide leadership and guidance on strategic facilities projects, as well as coordinating the Beautification Committee. Their participation and involvement demonstrate a continued commitment to our community.

In the Beginning

Every year for as long as I can remember, I've written an article about the beginning of the school year, focusing on the new faculty, new students, new concepts, new learning. And this year's article is no different, and yet, very different. For the first time in 30 years, there will be no information about the preschool. I'm officially a preschool graduate! Moving forward, my responsibilities begin with our Sunday PreK Religious School students and end with our high school seniors.

It's a big leap and yet it isn't as I've known most of these current students for many, many years. But making changes in our Religious School curriculum has been on my mind for a while, and over the summer, with the partnership of trusted colleagues Maddy Rothbard and Lisa Dubovy, we are charging ahead with some new focus. Our Hebrew curriculum will be much the same – letter and vowel identification and then decoding and the introduction of prayers from the Shabbat morning service. The bigger shift is in our Judaics curriculum, which will still spiral as the students move up in grades, but will have a segmented focus. Parsha will be the unit of study for kindergarten, first, and second grades, while third, fourth, and fifth will be focusing on Israel from our ancestors to today. Our sixth grade will continue its focus on kashrut and seventh with our Jewish world and service learning, and both will learn in a more targeted manner about the Holocaust. It's a bit of a shift, but with our new curriculum from Behrman House, the Center for Israel Education, and the Anti-Defamation League, we know we have the right amount of support for our teachers to access all the information they need. We are looking forward to an exciting year.

Youth Department

The Youth Department is up and running and I'm honored to take on this additional responsibility. With guidance and support from Jamie Lyons, who jumped in last year when needed, we have planned a full complement of activities for each of the youth groups – Chalutzim (grades K-2), Chaverim (grades 3-5), and Gesher (grades 6-7).

We are delighted to have Nic Poole returning to his position as Youth Advisor, and Nic will be joined by Tiana Plendl, who is helping to plan, prepare, and implement these programs as our Lead Advisor, alongside Nic. Back from a hugely successful stint as USY Advisor, is Alex Levin, who will continue to work closely with our tremendous USY Board and members.

Not only are we nearly into High Holiday season; not only are those of us with students in our household rolling with complicated scheduling for homework, games, scouts/youth group, tutoring for the SAT/ACT and nudging our kids to get their college applications underway or done; it's ELECTION SEASON! We're proud to announce that Etz Chaim Sisterhood, along with Etz Chaim's Social Action Committee and College Connection, is encouraging everyone to vote and giving you a tool to make it easier to do so!

Etz Chaim Sisterhood and the Women's League of Conservative Judaism encourages us to get involved in our community. In fact, it's what we're going to do and celebrate together at our **Membership Kickoff - Broads Broadening the Broader Community on September 7 at 7:00 p.m.** To RSVP, scan the QR code to the right or click the link: <u>www.etzchaim.net/events/sisterhood-membership-kickoff/</u>.

The official Election Day may be November 5 - and so may sound a ways off - but it is happening NOW! Now is the time to make sure your voter registration is up-to-date. And now is the time to request an absentee ballot if you may not be able to vote in person. Will you be out of town on November 5? Do you (or your kiddo) attend school out of state? And if they do, is it too far or difficult to plan to be home during early voting? Do you have health considerations that have you wanting to avoid crowds? If so, request an Absentee Ballot!

Absentee Ballots can be requested online. Below, you'll find the link to the My Voter Page of Georgia's Secretary of State. Please take a few minutes to click on the link both to confirm your voter registration status and, if voting by absentee ballot makes sense for you/your kiddo or loved one, follow the directions to request an absentee ballot as soon as possible. You may need to print out the form and scan it in once you've completed it, then just email it in. Once you receive your Absentee Ballot, take a minute right away to complete it and send it back. Be sure to follow the directions carefully, including signing & sealing the outer envelope. Given the slow speed of the postal service delivery in our area, please seriously consider sending it in via UPS or FedEx. It's the best way to assure that your vote is counted. Your vote is your voice. It matters!

Of course, please also plan to come to our wonderful Sisterhood events! We've got a lot going on before, during, and after the High Holidays! It is a busy time of year indeed!


