## Dan Dorsch Rabbi

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks defines faith as "the ability to live with delay without losing trust in the promise; to experience disappointment without losing hope, to know that the road between the real and the ideal is long and yet be willing to undertake the journey."

Siz Shver Zol Zayn a Yid. It's a hard time to be a Jew. There are moments where it feels like the deck is constantly stacked up against us. No one says anything to our faces, but they whisper behind our backs. When it comes to Israel, we are the only people who the world assumes does not know "what is good for us," and so they spend their time telling us when and if we have the right to defend ourselves.

Reflecting on this past election, I find it remarkable how each side found ways to exploit our insecurities. The message was the same. "Vote for me," each of the candidates said. "I will restore your fortunes and those of Israel and the Jewish people."

I get our obsession with political promises. It's easy to want to place our faith in a human messiah to fix our problems. Yet, in reality, what I have learned over the years is that with the exception of a few, truly loving allies, there is no one we can place trust in to fix our problems than in our God and in us. The Book of Psalms teaches us *Kol Adam Kozev*, that human beings are fallible, and that "all humans disappoint." Believing in us is the only thing that has ever truly worked.

When I was a young and impressionable *Rosh Edah* at Ramah in the Poconos, Camp Director Todd Zeff told us a story about his journey. Upon graduating college, he had been offered his dream corporate job working for Sony. The opportunities for growth were good. The pay Sony offered was excellent. He was tempted to take it. That's when a mentor told him: "You can take that job. But remember, there will always be someone else to sell records. There may not be someone else to step into your place as a rabbi."

Is it hard to keep faith when delayed results are part of the journey? You bet.

There is no delay when it comes to selling records.

Yet, as Rabbi Sacks points out, patience in the face of disappointment is the hallmark of what it means to be a Jew.

We've just been through an exhausting election season. Daylight hours are getting shorter. The weather is growing colder.

As a person of faith, I have not lost trust in the promise of a better future for the Jewish people. As the rabbi of our community, I have not lost faith in us. I am so glad we get to take this journey together.



## Jonathon Adler Assistant Rabbi

The word "luck" was constantly repeated throughout the course of my Installation weekend. Just about everyone kept saying how lucky the congregation is that I'm now the assistant rabbi. I'm so glad you feel that way, but I have to look at it from a different point of view. From where I'm sitting, I'm the lucky one. For me, getting to work here is a dream come true.

First of all, I can't imagine a better welcome than the one I received from all of you, both when I got here for the first time in 2023, as well as during my installation weekend. My family also noted how friendly everyone was and how welcomed they were all made to feel.

Chanukah is not Jewish Christmas. However, this time of year, we make it hard for young children to understand that. With all the bright lights, decorations, treats, Christmas cheer, and this year Chanukah falling on Christmas, it is quite confusing for young children to understand how different the holidays are. So how do we celebrate Chanukah in preschool?

We start long before the holiday, talking about how everyone is different. How we all have a light inside of us that shines brightly. That we can make our own light shine every day. The Chanukah story is about bravery and resilience. It is about hope and pride. It is a story of strength and conviction. We tell the story of the brave Maccabees and the strength of the Jewish people. We share how even though the Temple is destroyed, the Jewish people work together to build it again. 

# Religious School News

### Debbie Deutsch

Director, Religious School and Youth Programming



Kol Yisrael Aravim, Zeh Bazeh ~ All of Israel is responsible for each other ~ Talmud Shevuot 39a.

Teaching Religious School is many things – rewarding, satisfying, and sometimes even fun. Yet 5 hours of education a week doesn't offer much time for all the things we want our students to learn and experience. Should it be Hebrew decoding and learning prayers? Should it be Israel? Jewish history? Parshat Hashavua? So many important topics and so little time.

Our curriculum committee met over the summer and determined that Israel would be the focus for our 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders. We're delving into Israel as it relates to the ancestors we learned about in kindergarten – 2nd grade, the people who had the vision and were involved in the creation of the state of Israel, and the contributions of Israel (and Israelis) to the world today. As part of the introduction of these units, we are fortunate to have a partner in the Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta and their Schoenbaum Shinshinim program.

The Schoenbaum Shinshinim program brings Israel and Jewish Atlanta together. Shinshinim are 18-year-old high school graduates from all over Israel who complete a year of service in Jewish Atlanta, fostering connections to Israel for community members of all ages. They infuse Israeli culture across the community through art, song, dance, and holiday observances. The Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta and the Jewish Agency for Israel partner to bring these amazing teens to Atlanta each year. By sharing themselves and their personal stories with us, they make Israel real! This year, we are fortunate to be joined by Amit Ozeri, who is from Kibbutz Ramat Yohanan. Amit was with us in September so we could meet and get to know each other as he shared about his life in Israel. In October Amit taught us about how the High Holidays are celebrated in Israel.

Moving forward, Amit will be our direct connection to the map of Israel: where cities are located, the importance of certain cities, and what are they known for where our ancestors lived and died. He'll show us who are neighbors are and where they are located on the map. He'll share where he is from, where our students' families are from, where Israelis vacation, and answer questions from our students. This once-a-month experience will be a unique learning opportunity for our students to learn from Amit and we look forward to his time with us.



## Happy Chanukah ~ Chag Urim Sameach

Chaig Corum Sameach

As you face your Chanukiah (menorah), place the candles in their holders from right to left. As you light them, you light them from left to right, starting with the newest candle.

Lighting the Candles

The candles should be kindled after nightfall. The menorah should be placed near the window for all to see, safely away from curtains and shades.

On the third night of Chanukah, **Friday, December 27**, the Chanukah candles are kindled **before nightfall and before the Shabbat candles.** On the fourth night of Chanukah, **Saturday, December 28**, the Chanukah candles are kindled **after Havdalah.** 

Chanukah Blessings

Recite after the Shamash, the Helper candle, is lit but before the other candles are lit.
