I am excited that in conjunction with Moishe House, I will serve as a mentor for the Embark Fellowship for interfaith couples from across the City of Atlanta. The goal of Embark—which begins in Atlanta this month—is to create a non-judgmental space for interfaith couples to explore what their Jewish lives could look like alongside partners of different backgrounds. During sessions with other couples in a similar situation, the

group will focus on building and strengthening relationships in a warm, welcoming environment, with a rabbinic mentor to guide the process.

Why, as a conservative rabbi in 2024, should I be working on behalf of interfaith couples? Shouldn't that be the domain of reform rabbis?

The statistics don't lie. The PEW forum study of American Jews from 2020 reports that 72% of non-Orthodox American Jews who have gotten married since 2010 are in interfaith marriages. ¼ of Jews who identify as being Conservative Jews today have a non-Jewish partner or spouse. The words of the prophets "are written on the subway walls." Given that reality, I do believe that it's time that it's long past due that we shift the conversation about interfaith families from "shanda" to opportunity.

Too often we make the mistake of assuming that when a Conservative Jew decides not to marry Jewish they are rejecting the tenets of Conservative Judaism. In my experience, I have seen that many interfaith families who choose our synagogue continue to be committed to high levels of Jewish education, engagement, and commitment to Israel. They actively participate in our services and our programming. They serve on boards and committees. And all the more so, when they are younger, they actively seek counsel from a rabbi for how to live a Jewish life.

I don't want you to think I am being Pollyanna about it. There are inevitably Jews in every generation who do marry out our faith and run away as fast as they can. All of the data points to the strongest chance for a child to be connected to Judaism coming from a two-parent Jewish household. Our synagogue actively sponsors a conversion class, and both Rabbi Adler and I meet with candidates.

Yet running this cohort is an acknowledgment of our present reality: that conversion prior to marriage (or ever) may not work for everyone, that relationships are complex, and that we are better served as a movement by opening up a door rather than closing it. Interfaith couples already have so many strikes against them. Why as a rabbi would I close the door to having conversations with a couple that could have a meaningful impact on the way they imagine their Jewish future?

Some of you may have heard me announce this fellowship over the High Holy Days. It's getting a lot of positive buzz. People feel comfortable meeting with me to discuss their own children and grandchildren, or even their own situations.

I am honored to have the opportunity to serve as a spiritual guide for these young couples as they embark on their Jewish journey.

I hope you all saw the email that Rabbi Dorsch sent out last month explaining that I am in need of a kidney transplant. It's a strange place to be in, asking for such a profound act of generosity, kindness, and *pikuach nefesh* – the mitzvah of sustaining of a life, but I'm so grateful to be in a community we can send out this important request. According to the National Kidney Foundation, there are over 100,000 Americans in need of a kidney transplant, but only 17,000 of these

life-changing operations are performed each year. There is absolutely no reason this should be the case. Kidney donation from living donors is generally quite safe, and there is no cost to the donor, except for the time you dedicate to this process.

I want to talk about organ donation as a Jewish value. In the *Mishnah (Sanhedrin 4:5)*, we read "anyone who saves a life is as if they saved an entire world." The Rabbinical Assembly's Committee on Jewish Laws and Standards states, "the preservation of human life is obligatory, not optional." Organ donation falls firmly into this category. If you would like to come into my office to learn about organ donation as a mitzvah, please let me know; I'd be thrilled to sit down and discuss this with you. And this discussion is by no means limited to kidney donation. Checking the "Organ Donation" box on your Driver's License is also a mitzvah.

And if you're unable to fulfill the mitzvah of *pikuach nefesh* by donating an organ, remember that there is still so much you can do. *Gemilut chasadim*, acts of loving kindness, includes the mitzvah of *bikkur cholim*, visiting the sick, and our Chesed Committee is deeply committed to this mitzvah (and many more). Please reach out to the office to get in touch if this opportunity speaks to you.

On another note, I am so grateful for the opportunities I have to get to know more congregants. This is why I started "Java Nagilah," a twice-monthly session at two different coffee shops in the area, usually the first and third Friday of each month. We can talk about Shabbat, the weekly parashah, or simply schmooze and get to know each other better. Please take a look at the Etz Chaim calendar for the dates and locations.




A Community Is Too Heavy To Carry Alone ~ Deuteronomy Rabbah 1:10
