

Reflecting on my life, I discovered something about myself which, not all that surprisingly, is common to many people. When something in my life happens that is completely out of my control, I find healthy ways to take control in other areas of my life where I can exhibit control.

The area where I do this is regarding my diet and exercise. In general, I must confess I am not mindful about what I eat or the amount of exercise that I get (if you are my doctor, pretend you didn't read that). However, if something happens that is out of my control, I go back to the long-forgotten Peloton. I use an app to record the food that I eat. It may seem a little compulsive. But it helps satisfy my urge for control, with the added benefit of making me feel physically and mentally healthy.

I also turn to Jewish practice. Years ago, when COVID started (talk about a life event out of your control), I began studying Daf Yomi. Daf Yomi is a program during which a person studies a folio of Talmud a day until seven and a half years later, you've completed the entire Talmud. During quarantine, in addition to taking an evening walk, I would study my folio of Talmud every day. Not surprisingly, once COVID restrictions ended, my study continued but became less diligent.

You don't have to be a "control freak" or obsessive-compulsive to understand how loss of control can affect your life (for the record, I am neither). All of us go through cycles where we encounter feelings of struggle, loss, or hardship. Fortunately, it's in these circumstances that we can count our blessings as a part of a religious tradition that excels at fostering opportunities to regain control in challenging times.

Perhaps, the easiest example for Jews to connect with is the power of saying kaddish after a loss. Some say kaddish because of the kabbalistic idea that it helps the soul of our loved one ascend to heaven (there is a regaining of control here). But we cannot forget that going through loss leaves us feeling scared, alone, and like our entire world has been turned upside down.

Judaism therefore has a ritual that insists that for up to an entire year we attend services and become part of a community. Saying kaddish regularly restores that sense of purpose and control that our loss took away from us. It's no wonder then that the overwhelming majority of people who attend daily minyan today were at one point themselves kaddish sayers. These are people who refound their purpose, saw the value of community, and never stopped coming.

Thankfully, I have personally found healthy mechanisms in my life to regain control, even when I lose it in other areas. You may likely have them as well. Not everyone is so lucky. Some people seek unhealthy pathways—drugs, alcohol, etc.—as a means of dulling the pain and giving them an illusion of control, but ultimately, leading down a rabbit hole of an even greater loss of control than when we started.

Should you be struggling, please do not hesitate to reach out for help. Rebbe Nachman of Breslav may have noted that "the world can feel like a narrow bridge, but that we do not have to be afraid." We are a community of rabbis, professionals, and kind members of our community who are all willing to help guide you across in hard times.

Over the holiday break, our family headed to Cocoa Beach, Florida, and I had the opportunity to share one of my all-time favorite movies with Glynis and the kids - The Secret Life of Walter Mitty. Aiden, Emma and Evan had never seen it, so we turned it into a special family movie night. For me, it wasn't just about watching a film; it was one of those moments I'll always hold onto. This movie has everything—amazing music, a fantastic cast, stunning visuals, and some pretty deep life lessons. Watching it with my family made it all the more meaningful.

If you haven't seen it yet (and seriously, you should), *The Secret Life of Walter Mitty* is an adventure/comedy starring Ben Stiller. It's about a quiet, daydreaming photo editor at LIFE magazine who ends up going on a real-life adventure that takes him to incredible places like Greenland and the Himalayas. It's a story about stepping out of your comfort zone, facing challenges and discovering who you really are. Woven throughout the movie is a version of the original LIFE magazine motto — and it sums it up perfectly: "To see the world, things dangerous to come to, to see behind walls, to draw closer, to find each other and to feel. That is the purpose of life."

What hits me every time I watch it is the message: Don't let fear or routine stop you from becoming the person you want to be or living the life you dream about. Walter starts out stuck—playing it safe and living in his head—but his journey teaches him courage and shows him the beauty of taking risks and embracing life.

The soundtrack is another reason I love the movie. Songs like "Stay Alive" by José González perfectly match Walter's transformation as he goes from just dreaming to actually living. Then there's "Dirty Paws" by Of Monsters and Men, which is woven into the film in such a powerful way. It adds this dreamy, adventurous vibe that perfectly captures Walter's journey as he steps into the wider world. And "Space Oddity"? Absolute perfection, especially as a metaphor for taking a leap of faith into the unknown. The music ties the whole experience together, making it unforgettable.

While we were in Cocoa Beach, we also watched a rocket launch – the first time we've seen one. Standing on the beach under the stars, watching it light up the midnight sky and then fade into the darkness, was incredible. It reminded me of Walter Mitty's message about breaking barriers and going after what seems impossible. That rocket launch felt like a real-life symbol of dreaming big and making it happen.

As we kick off this new year, I can't help but think about those themes—both from the movie and the rocket launch. What's holding us back? What dreams are we shelving because they feel too far-fetched or scary? Life is messy and unpredictable, but just like Walter (and those rockets), we're capable of incredible things if we're willing to take that first step.

We as a congregation support this concept not just on this day but all year round.

The Morning Minyan folks give to the Tzedakah/Pushka Fund daily. That money helps us to support a congregation in Uganda. B'nai Mitzvah projects support various social action activities. The Religious School has done bagel rescues. The Preschool does animal rescue donation drives. Congregants give and participate in the Hunger Walk every year. We have a blood drive in January. We donate food to Rebecca's Tent in February. And of course, we continue to fill the food barrels on Yom Kippur, and throughout the year.

The newly revised Chesed Committee extends itself into our community to spread support and goodwill.

It is wonderful that we live this concept of Tikkun Olam all year round and it doesn't have to be a big deal. Just the acknowledgment that we all need each other to sometimes just get through the day.

So, remember, sometimes simply a smile and holding the door open for someone else is all you really need to pay it forward.

The holiday of Tu B 'Shevat is a celebration of the trees. It is celebrated on the fifteenth day of Shevat, and we honor the day by planting trees, eating fruit, and even having a Tu B 'Shevat Seder. We celebrate trees, what they give to us and how we, as humans, can protect trees and strengthen our connection to nature. These are all beautiful traditions and ways to enjoy this holiday.

Do you know what we do to celebrate Tu B 'Shevat in our Preschool? We plant parsley seeds. Parsley does not grow on trees. It will never become a tree. So why parsley seeds? The time between Tu B 'Shevat and Pesach is the perfect time to plant and grow enough parsley to have at our Pesach Seder. Of course, we take nature walks to look at different trees. We read books about trees. We taste fruits that grow on trees. And we even have a Tu B 'Shevat Seder to taste the various species of fruits. But as far as actually planting trees, we need something a little more foolproof.

Planting parsley seeds is a way to allow young children to move through the growing process of a plant and learn how to nurture and care for a growing, living thing. It gives the children an opportunity to watch something grow in front of their eyes. Planting parsley on Tu B 'Shevat also connects one holiday to another which would normally not be connected. Tu B'Shevat being our earliest Spring holiday and Pesach being our main Spring holiday makes an example of time passing, and of patiently waiting for the parsley to grow. It is so exciting to see the children's faces light up when the first buds of parsley peek through the dirt and show themselves. The ownership and pride the preschoolers feel when they get to clip the parsley plants and place them on the Pesach seder plate is priceless. So we will say, "Happy Birthday to the Trees!" And we will plant our seeds and prepare for our future.

Religious School News




With every new year, change is inevitable. Our Religious School is no different. Last month we brought some new things to our curriculum, and we are pleased with our efforts thus far. Standing out as one of our most impactful changes is the addition of our Holocaust curriculum in 6th and 7th grades. Utilizing members of our community and Kennesaw State University, as well as the Echoes and Reflections curriculum, a joint program of the ADL, USC Shoah Foundation, and Yad Vashem, our students are getting a comprehensive introduction to the Holocaust. They are learning terminology through primary sources, inquiry-based learning, and critical thinking. The goal of the lessons is to help foster empathy while contextualizing the history of the event. It's a heavy topic but one we are delving into with forethought and intention.

3rd, 4th, and 5th graders will delve more into their curriculum objectives about Israel. We've learned a bit about the geography from our Shinshin, Amit Ozeri, but we are ready for more. Our goal is to have the students feel a connection to Israel and we are working toward that connection in many ways. We will make the connection between the Temple of long ago and the Kotel, the western wall in Jerusalem. We'll connect our ancestors to the places they lived to what is that location today. We'll bring in our community experts to tell the stories of their connections to the land as a segue way to the concept of peoplehood and our connections as Jews to the land of Israel. This is also new territory for us and we are excited to bring this to our school.

Kindergarten, 1st, and 2nd grades will forge ahead with parsha learning. Although it is called parshat hashavua, the parsha of the week, we know that some Torah portions require and deserve more attention than one Sunday session gives us. Our teachers are methodically covering the stories of Bereshit, Genesis, throughout the year, while 2nd grade is getting ready to tackle the stories of Shemot, the book of Exodus.

And our sweet pre-K class will continue learning about the holidays, mitzvot, and what it means to be Jewish.

Your vote also delivers support for key civil society organizations and helps promote gender and LGBTQ+ equality in Israel and the Jewish world.
- 4. **Voting MERCAZ USA** will make sure that KKL/JNF's \$2 billion budget goes not to extremists' pet projects, but to those who need it most: the communities hardest hit on October 7th. We'll also ensure our hostages and their families are taken care of through the government's Hostages and Hostages Family Directorate, which is now under the auspices of the WZO.
- 5. **Voting MERCAZ USA** prevents a takeover of the Jewish Agency by ultra-Orthodox extremists, which would endanger the ability of so many in our communities to make Aliyah and be recognized as Jewish in the Jewish state. It would also put our ability to fund shlichim and shinshinim in our communities at risk.

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
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








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
